July 28–29, 2012 Exodus 7–11 *"Ten Plagues and the Last God Standing"* Pastor Gary Hamrick

The Israelites had been slaves in Egypt for 400 years. Their cries went up to God and He was concerned about them. So God called and commissioned Moses (who was 80 years old), and his brother, Aaron (who was 83 years old) to be the Leader and the Spokesman for "Operation Exodus" — when God miraculously delivered the Hebrew slaves out of their bondage in Egypt and took them to the Promised Land of Israel. God would accomplish his plan through a series of ten plagues that rattled the nation of Egypt until Pharaoh was not only willing to let the Israelites go, he was also *very* eager to help them leave!

The details about the ten plagues or judgments that God brought upon the nation of Egypt are given in Exodus 7–11. The first two of each series come with (1) a warning, and (2) a call to repentance. The last in each series came without warning.

The miraculous events that transpired in these chapters are the source of a great deal of criticism from many skeptics. Unfortunately, in the world today there are many "higher critics" that try to explain the miracles of the Bible in natural ways. When you try to explain the supernatural with a natural approach, you just end up looking silly. Skeptics, however, would argue that Christians are the ones who look silly for believing that these are actual plagues sent by the mighty hand of God. It's interesting to note that there were Egyptian skeptics who even the skeptics who confirmed the reality of God's signs and wonders. In the middle of the third plaque, some of Pharaoh's magicians and sorcerers acknowledged, "*This is the finger of God!*"¹

The key to understanding why God chose to deliver the Israelites in this particular way, with these particular plagues, has to do with Exodus 7:5. which tells us that it's God's

purpose that "... the Egyptians will know that I am the Lord when I stretch out my hand against Egypt and bring the Israelites out of it."

You see, God is not only concerned about the Israelites and their slavery; he's also concerned about the Egyptians who don't know Him.

God's View Of Humanity Is Different Than Ours

- 1. God not only cares about the oppressed, he also about the oppressors.
- 2. God wants to reach not just the afflicted, but also the afflicters.
- 3. God wants to save not just the hated, but also the haters.

So what does God do? God is going to target ten specific gods of the Egyptians with ten specific plagues. God uses the plagues to expose how illegitimate their gods are, and how real he is! He will systematically discredit ten of their major gods, one at a time, until the people are left with no choice but to recognize the last God standing!

The Last God Standing

- 1. The Nile becomes Blood 2
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Hapi, who was thought to be the father of gods as well as the god of the Nile who brought water to all Egypt.
- 2. The Invasion of Frogs³
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Hegt, the frog goddess, who was the symbol of fertility.
- 3. The Invasion of Gnats⁴
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Geb, who was their god of the land.
- 4. The Swarm of Flies ⁵
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Khepfi, the god of insects.
- 5. The Death of Livestock ⁶
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian gods Apis, the sacred bull god, and Hathor, the cow goddess.

- 6. Boils upon Men and Animals⁷
 - a. God discredited the Egyptian god Thoth, the god of medicine.⁸
- 7. The Hailstorms ⁹
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian gods Nut, the god of the sky, and Seth, the protector of the crops.
- 8. The Swarms of Locust ¹⁰
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Anubis, the god of the fields.
- 9. Darkness¹¹
 - a. God discredits the Egyptian god Ra, the sun god.
- 10. The Death of the Firstborn 12
 - a. Pharaoh was considered to be the incarnation of Ra, the sun god. Thus, his firstborn was likewise considered 'deity'; this was in essence seen as the death of a god.

All of these plaques were God's way of exposing the false gods of the Egyptians so that they would know that He is God, and there is no other!

God will go to great lengths to expose the emptiness of the things we serve, the 'gods' we serve as well. All of this was God's way of exposing the false gods of the Egyptians so that they would know that He is God, and there is no other!

⁸ The Egyptians worshipped several medical deities and even occasionally offered humans as sacrifices to them. People were burned alive on a high altar, and their ashes were cast into the air with the hope that every scattered ash might bring a blessing. When Moses was told by God to scatter ashes from a furnace to the wind, painful boils that broke out on the people, shamed the god, Thoth.
